

Dear First Church Family,



## UNITED METHODIST WOMEN

December seems to be an appropriate time to reflect on the previous year and evaluate where we currently stand. Additionally, the District United Methodist Women's organization has asked us to look back to our beginning and share the history of UMW here at First United Methodist Church.

United Methodist Women have actively participated in the life of First United Methodist Church since about 1942. Starting out as Women's Society of Christian Service, the name changed to United Methodist Women in 1973. This name change was announced by president Marcia-Mae Glauner. The first officers of UMW were Helen Swarthout, Sarah Chamberlain, Sue Darnall, Janie Lou Overstreet, and Ocie Martin. Mission coordinators included Judy Knorr and Jane Crutchfield. These women were just beginning many years of service. In fact, throughout our long history the main constant has been service – service to people locally and worldwide.

Approximately \$3,700 is given every year to support local service organizations. In 2018 we decided to add Kairos Prison Ministry. We provided 200+ dozen cookies and \$500 to help bring Christianity to inmates at Huttonsville Correctional Center. Hygiene kits were assembled and delivered to Women's Aid in Crisis by Evening Circle. \$2,600 went to the district and then partly on to the state and national levels to help support missionaries, community centers, treatment facilities, and advocacy on behalf of women, children, and youth.

The role of United Methodist Women at FUMC is gradually changing. Due to our aging membership, we have shifted more towards advocacy and try to motivate others to get involved in projects we initiate. Our local unit joined with the UMW national campaign "Be Just! Be Green" to encourage environmentally conscious practices. We promoted the use of cloth bags for shopping, discouraged the use of non-reusable drinking containers, requested the church use paper rather than plastic or Styrofoam, and decided at events we sponsor to use regular dishes instead of disposable. We just started the collection of empty prescription and over-the-counter medicine bottles. They will be mailed to Matthew 25 Ministries for inclusion with medical shipments. We appreciate the support of First United Methodist Church's members in helping us achieve our goals.

We will close out 2018 with two events in December. The unit meeting Dec. 6, 7 pm, will include the program A Look at Jesus' Birth Through the Eyes of a Midwife presented by Dr. Susan Rice. Our annual Cookies and More sale is December 8 beginning at 8:30 am. Please sign up to help at the UMW table in Linger Hall or email [barbaraloftis9@gmail.com](mailto:barbaraloftis9@gmail.com).

### LEGEND OF THE CANDY CANE


A candy maker in Indiana wanted to make a candy that would be a witness, so he made the Christmas Candy Cane. He incorporated several symbols for the birth, ministry, and death of Jesus Christ.

He began with a stick of pure white, hard candy. White to symbolize the Virgin Birth and the sinless nature of Jesus, and hard to symbolize the Solid Rock, the foundation of the church, and firmness of the promises of God.

The candy maker made the candy in the form of a \*J\* to represent the precious name of Jesus, who came to earth as our savior. It also represents the staff of the \*Good Shepherd\* with which He reaches down into the ditches of the world to lift out the fallen lambs who, like all sheep, have gone astray. Thinking that the candy was somewhat plain, the candy maker stained it with red stripes. He used the three small stripes to show the stripes of the scourging Jesus received by which we are healed. The large red stripe was for the blood shed by Jesus on the Cross so that we could have the promise of eternal life, if only we put our faith and trust in Him.
